In the arms of residents after 70 years: The summit of Jangsan

The summit of Jangsan, a representative mountain in Haeundae-gu, will be open from January 1st next year. The first sunrise of the 2021 New Year can also be seen at Jangsan summit.

Haeundae is expected to conclude an agreement soon after having recently completed consultations with the Ministry of National Defense. The summit of Jangsan has been restricted from public access for 70 years since the Korean War in 1950. Currently, there are wireless base stations of 9 organizations including the Korean military, the US military, and the police at the summit. The area which has been decided for the opening is where the Jangsan sign is under the jurisdiction of the Ministry of National Defense. Next to it, the area where the US military base was located during the Korean War is now closed, and there are plans to open it completely by conducting SOFA negotiations with the US military. Civic groups in Haeundae have been carrying out a campaign to restore Jangsan summit since 2011, but the Ministry of National Defense had been opposed to the opening, giving reasons of the security of various facilities and SOFA regulations. Haeundae decided on the opening as a result of residents' hopes for the opening and plans for the designation of a municipal park in place, and after several consultations with the Ministry of National Defense, the summit of Jangsan has been fully opened. Accordingly, Haeundae is paving the path to the summit of Jangsan and reinstalling the signboard and CCTV. Iron fences are also reinforced to control public access to military security areas. The summit of Jangsan is expected to be a popular spot overlooking the city and the sea in Haeundae.





Full efforts to recover damage from heavy rain

Haeundae organized an emergency budget in July and August to repair damage from torrential rains and support households suffering from flood damage. Haeundae provides priority support to areas in need of urgent restoration and flood-damaged households using 2.7 billion won, including reserve funds and disaster management funds. Among the 29 public facilities that have been damaged, 14 areas including the area where the hiking trails were washed away in the Jangsan Valley area and the area where the road was damaged in Dalmaji in the Jungdong area will be repaired first. Plans are in place to pay out 2 million won in disaster support within this month to 160 households affected by flooding. In the long term, plans are to install additional rainwater pipes and expand the pump capacity of the drainage pumping station in the BEXCO and Centumfiore apartments in Jaesong-dong, which are frequent flooding areas.



Full efforts to recover damage from heavy rain

With cases of COVID 19 on the rise again, Haeundae is working hard to prevent the spread of the virus by holding an emergency meeting of the Disaster and Safety Countermeasures Headquarters chaired by the district mayor on August 20 and strengthening preventive measures and inspection of public facilities. Haeundae plans to decide whether to hold festivals and various sports events in the second half of the year while observing the progress of COVID 19. As group infections in religious facilities have been occurring recently, the district office is visiting churches and cathedrals every Sunday from 10am to 11am to check whether prevention rules are observed. In addition, a survey was conducted for the installation and use of electronic access registers for 65 internet cafes. The four libraries in Haeundae are currently temporarily closed. Due to the spread of COVID 19, the beach was closed early on August 21, and it is now only possible to play in the sea. Until the end of this month, it is mandatory to wear a mask on the beach and eating and drinking in groups of more than two people is prohibited. From August 22, it is mandatory to wear masks indoors, on buses, in taxis, and in performance halls, except in unavoidable circumstances such as eating and drinking. From October 13 after the guidance period, you will have to pay a fine of up to 100,000 won if you do not wear a mask. In the case of city buses, disinfection and cleaning are carried out at least twice a day inside and outside the vehicle.
